SUMMARY

Living at The Agricultural Option-The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme (YRACDP) is the command and physical expression of The Agriculture Option (TAO), that is developing connected and thriving agricultural production and processing communities that integrates young people in agricultural faculties of tertiary institutions across Nigeria, and its host communities into its circular economic activities.

Living at TAO will build a system of connected communities that are close and linked to existing tertiary institutions across Nigeria and will:

- Engage students of agriculture in tertiary institution for commercially viable contract agriculture as part of their education and appreciation of a career in agriculture after school.
- Deliver year-round cultivation of contiguous land using irrigation, mechanization, and precision agriculture.
- Establish low complexity input manufacturing and produce processing facilities on the farm locations to deliver robust training and commercial appreciation, cost efficiency and reduction in post-harvest losses.
- Support inclusion of the host communities in economic activities-with a focus on turning by-products of farming and processing into profitable businesses (from cottage industries) for the people of the communities.
- Integrate young people in a skill development fellowship, that will support the creation of a pool of well-trained skills for employment in Nigeria's commercial agriculture.

Thereby providing the benefits of:

- A strategic and tactical tool for ensuring food security, youth employment and agricultural exports.
- An intentionally curated circular agricultural economy that includes the host communities through the value chain.
- Education and upskilling of young people to appreciate and engage in viable commercial agriculture in low-risk spaces, with competitive financial and economic benefits.
- Financial inclusion.
- A beautiful, functional, and sustainable environment.

At inception, this effort seeks to deliver six clusters, each of 5 thousand hectares, a processing mill, a small town of 1000 students, fellows and small businesses drawn from the student and lecturer bodies of the adjacent tertiary institutions, and inclusion of additional 5 thousand locals in an out-grower primary agricultural production and circular economy scheme per hub.

System wide, it will directly deliver 144 thousand hectares of high precision multi-cycle cultivated land, over 7.2 million metric tons of agricultural produce per annum; 144 integrated agricultural processing facilities; 144 thousand well trained students, fellows and small businesses per annual cycle; that will add up to 400 thousand hectares of high precision cultivated land per year; 720 thousand jobs provided within host communities and direct productivity of over 5.6 trillion Naira, whereas over 50% can be strategically or tactically purposed for either food security or foreign exchange earnings as demanded by the fiscal requirement of the country per time.

The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme will be the first integrated agricultural system that utilizes the abundant opportunity provided by the over 300 thousand students studying agricultural majors in Nigeria's tertiary institutions at any point it time, and the established university and host communities.

As a highly curated command programme within a wider agricultural ecosystem of TAO, the YRACDP presents the advantage of being the tip of the spear for Nigeria's effort at fighting food insecurity, youth unemployment and non-diversified foreign exchange outlook. It is potentially a legacy play not only in Nigeria, but possibly all of Africa.

THE PROBLEM

At the current rate of population growth and agricultural production, Nigeria's food importation bill may rise to over US\$5 Billion by 2030, as food imports continues to increase and substitute local production. During the same period, over 25 million educated Nigerian youths may not finds jobs. The present and quick win jobs and businesses of Nigeria's young people are in agriculture and home-grown food production that will bring home most of its food consumption that is imported. However, this will not be achieved without improving productivity from the current levels seen especially in primary agricultural production.

Nigeria's agricultural productivity situation is such that about 37% of its arable land is cultivated, and less than 30% of its cultivated land production capacity is realized-because of single cycle rain fed cropping that is a result of inadequate and assessable irrigation. To put this in context, Nigeria only irrigates about 290.4 thousand hectares, which is about 0.9% of its cultivated land. To further compound this problem, this inefficient cropping effort does not integrate into processing at farm site for efficient value addition, nor does it support a deliberate system of incremental improvement or skill development for improved productivity or participant profile-leading into a case of triple jeopardy, where a lot of value is left on the table and unrealized.



Going by its current population growth rate, from 2022, Nigeria will add the population of Ghana to its population every four years-or if you like, every presidential term. As we look to agriculture to feed and employ this growing population, it is time for new thinking and bold ambitions in such undertakings as the Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme

A NEW OPPORTUNITY

Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme - **An integrated Agricultural Development System**

The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme seeks to create thriving and connected agricultural production, processing and circular economy clusters; and integrate them into a system that supports irrigation, and technology aided optimal businesses. YRACDP is focused on students of agricultural tertiary institution for early appreciation and skills for commercial agriculture, incentivized through fair and commensurate economic participation in ventures.

Primary production will be integrated with onsite processing for efficiency and loss reduction, while making sure that the host communities are fully included and catered for economically and socially.

Furthermore, it will train agricultural students to become professionals in some or all areas of an integrated agricultural business-thus preparing them early for well fulfilling jobs or entrepreneurship in commercial agriculture.

It will catalyze the necessary and urgent drive to improve the profile of the average Nigerian farmer from a 51-year-old uneducated male, in subsistence agriculture; to a 25–30-year-old educated male and female, in tune with modern and precision agricultural practices and engaged in commercial agriculture of up to 50 hectares in land holding, and earning more than 50 million Naira per annum.

The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme is structured around components that are designed to ensure full integration and sustainability. All components will be deployed in each cluster.

Primary Production

Commercial agricultural considerations with modern and most impactful practices will be at the center of each Young Ranchers cluster and the full complement of the Young Ranchers System. Clusters will produce in agricultural areas and value chains of their comparative advantage after considering such factors as the adjacent tertiary institution, vegetation, production advantage, strategic and tactical consideration for food and export, markets and access to other factors of production.

Engineering

To adapt technology and localize agricultural engineering and machinery solutions, YRACDP will engage the agricultural engineering students available in host tertiary institutions to situate engineering capabilities to the peculiarity of each cluster. The engineering outlook will consider elements such as soil and water properties and conservation, crop processing and storage, and farm power requirements in machine design and fabrication. Engineering at YRACDP will catalyze a home-grown agricultural machinery industry in all clusters and Nigeria.

Infrastructure

For crop production, each cluster will include at least 5 thousand hectares of fully irrigated land to guarantee 2-3 cycles of grain crop farming and 4-6 metric tons of grain yield per hectare per cycle, making 12-18 tons per hectare per year. This is against 1 cycles of production and 1.5 metric tons of grain yield per hectare obtainable in Nigeria today. Animal husbandry and aquaculture will also see the same levels of improvement and efficiency. A small town of between 250-1 thousand unit accommodation units and amenities will be built to house the youth skill development fellows, circular economy businesses in incubation and the essential staff in each cluster.

Input Manufacturing and Produce Processing

Each cluster will include its low complexity input manufacturing-such as poultry feed, fish fingerling and crop manure; produce processing, packaging, storage, and outbound supply chain origination, on site. This will make for efficiency and total cost reduction, post-harvest loss reduction, and value addition for improved economic outcomes. More importantly it will provide students and fellows a platform for learning and appreciation of the practical requirements, processes, procedure and business of integrated production and processing in the value chains of focus. These skills and hands on experiences are expected to translate to TAO supported integrated commercial agriculture undertakings of fellows when they exit the programme

Community Inclusion and Development

The student and fellow communities will be fully integrated into the clusters. For primary production, 1 thousand students and fellows will each be given 5 hectares of land within the available 5 thousand hectares of land per cluster, to farm and process in a contract production model, using cluster utilities and resources. These will include mechanization, irrigation, processing, funding, and other capabilities presented by TAO. Furthermore, community members will support areas such as processing, small town management, logistic and administration. The skill development fellowship programme for young people will also be integrated into the production activities of the cluster to aid diversity and improve economic activities in the host community. To provide ample incentives, financial benefits of up to 50% of value across the value chain will accrue to students and fellows, with each student making up to 10 million Naira per annum at optimal performance.

Education

The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme will deliberately approach improvement in the science, business, and social aspects of its deployment for individual cluster, total system, and Nigeria's agriculture. The Young Ranchers institute will drive a home grown educational and research component of its productivity improvement and sustainability outlooks, while incorporating its fellowship for skill development of its students, fellows and interested young graduates as part of faculty, cluster technical staff and participants, with considerations for the peculiarities of individual clusters and aggregate system.

Technology

Precision technology, information technology, digital productivity tools and digital financial services are some of the vehicles that will aid the delivery of Young Ranchers' exponential improvements in farming cycles, yield, cost efficiency, loss reduction, financial inclusion, and market access. Young Ranchers will deploy these technologies across its clusters as it seeks to further use them to enable connectivity of the entire system to achieve platform effects. A central command center will provide situational awareness, early warning, and early issue resolution capabilities for individual clusters and the entire Young Ranchers system.

Financial Inclusion of Young People and Agriculture

With about 5.6 trillion Naira in direct production value and a potential 12 trillion Naira in transaction value moving within the Young Ranchers Cluster Development system per year, there is great opportunity to create its own financial system that will focus on financial inclusion of its stakeholders, especially students, fellows, and beginner farmers. This financial services and inclusion outlook is designed to primarily support production, thus creating great opportunity for exponential expansion.

Boat - A TAO component and fully digital microfinance bank supported by a network of agricultural retail agents will be deployed for the Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme to ease financial inclusion of its participants. The bank will provide seamless services such as data driven, few questions asked and integrated credit for fellows, students, out growers and incubated small companies in the circular economy. Furthermore, payments, insurance, and cash management for about 144 thousand direct participants and about 720 thousand indirect participants sourced from the host communities.

A microfinance bank layered on Young Ranchers can generate as much as 100 billion Naira in revenues per annum, which will be available for plough back for further investment in youth focused agriculture, and will be among the top microfinance institutions in Africa.

Youth and Gender Inclusion

As their population increases and opportunities for economic inclusion diminishes, young people should be at the front and center of all development effort in Nigeria today. Therefore, 90% of participation in the Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme will be focused on and reserved for young people in a 50:50 gender split. 100% of the skill development fellowship and beginner farmer component will be reserved for young people. Young people in fellowship will further strengthen the technical staff pool available to clusters and the entire system in such areas as agricultural extension, research, engineering, business, processing supervision and cluster administration, thus increasing the job creation outlook of the Programme

Operations of the **Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme** will be both centralized and decentralized across components to provide for the most efficiency and effectiveness gains.

Deployment

Young Ranchers clusters will be deployed adjacent to each of the earmarked 144 tertiary institutions with agriculture faculties across the 6 geopolitical zones of Nigeria. Young Ranchers will approach State Governments and landowners for irrigable land and will take title ownership of the land to afford it the leverage for long term financing and development of assets on the land.

Model

The Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme will operate in a PPP-P model (Public, Private Partnership-with People) The last P standing for People (student and fellows that will be integral partners with economic benefits) intensive development that includes the people of the host community. Capable commercial agricultural operators will be invited to manage land, irrigation, processing and utility components of the clusters. A performance bond may be required from commercial operators to demonstrate capacity and full interest.

Technology

For standardization, uniformity, data to wisdom, quality management, and traceability; technology will be deployed centrally through the Young Ranchers Cluster Development system and provided to individual clusters in a subscription model. Efficiency, security, and performance improving technology resources such as enterprise resource planning (ERP), monitoring and evaluation sensors, situational awareness capabilities, reporting, learning and community platforms, digital market place and precision agriculture capabilities will be provided across the system.

A centrally structured technology deployment will afford the Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme visibility of its aggregate investments and their performance in real time across clusters, and in individual clusters. The technology outlook will create performance measurement and comparison matrix and a considerable savings in deployment cost.

Mechanization

It is also important that mechanization is approached with standardization, uniformity, cost, and quality management in mind. Mechanization will be deployed centrally through the Young Ranchers system; and provided to clusters in a subscription model. Efficiency and performance equipment such as irrigation, tractors, sprayers, ploughs, harrows, planters, and drones will be provided across the system.

A centrally structured mechanization deployment that is provided to clusters in a subscription model will improve asset utilization, reduce capital expenditure outlay at cluster level, and equipment maintenance encumbrances of the clusters, which will avail clusters and total system the opportunity of focusing on low cost and high impact production.

Education

All areas of research, knowledge and skill development will be deployed centrally. Research and development frameworks, knowledge mainstreaming, fellowship curriculum development and enhancement, participant selection criteria, onboarding, assessment and total system research, knowledge and skill development delivery will be managed centrally for standardization, uniformity, and quality management.

Financial Inclusion

A Microfinance Bank will be incorporated to support the last mile financial services requirement of the Young Ranchers Agricultural Cluster Development Programme, having a central head office administration that will cater to management components such as strategy, product development, risk management, policies, processes, procedures, and treasury management.

Branches and agencies will be deployed at each cluster for operations and last mile service delivery.

Brand Development, Marketing, and Distribution

Primary agricultural production and processing across the system will be deployed in a contract production model with students and fellows as the primary contractors and beneficiaries. Clusters will feed their produce into a central brand. Brand development, marketing and distribution will be managed centrally under a master brand and sub brands to cater for individual categories, segments and cluster identification-where necessary. This will allow for consistent brand messaging and quality, while reaping the benefits of economies of scale in cost, brand equity and brand premium.

Participant Management

Agriculture focused tertiary institutions provide an ample pool of potential participants. The choice of agriculture majors in tertiary institutions stems from their ongoing interaction with agriculture as they study, and their possible appreciation of the opportunities available therein.

YRACDP is positioned as a prestigious programme therefore eligibility criteria are stringent and include good academic standing at CGPA of not less than 3.5 points and school attendance of above 90%. These criteria are indicators of strong character, diligence, responsibility, and self-leadership which are necessary for success in the programme.

Participant performance on the YRACDP will be on a continuous assessment basis with parameters including effectiveness on production, processes, community, and business, using data drawn from their usage of TAO components such as Discover, YR, Boat, Telagri and Farm Tinder.

Activity data from Telagri ERP will form the fulcrum of assessment, while venture performance will form basis for retention in the programme.

Curriculum Development

The YRACDP seeks to equip young students, fellows, and community members with the requisite skills necessary to perform optimally in all and specific operational areas of an integrated agriculture effort (from cultivation through processing to distribution), or as agricultural entrepreneurs, that will provide services in one or more areas of agricultural value chains. The curricular framework of YRACDP's effort considers and caters to the knowledge, skills, and hands-on experience requirement for effective participation in an integrated agriculture effort and circular economy. It includes areas such as technical, business, leadership, community relations and the demonstration of knowledge and skills in a practical setup.

- Ability to lead and manage a small to medium commercial agricultural or agribusiness enterprise.
- An appreciation of agriculture and agribusiness as a viable career option and a path towards nation building in economic and social dimensions.

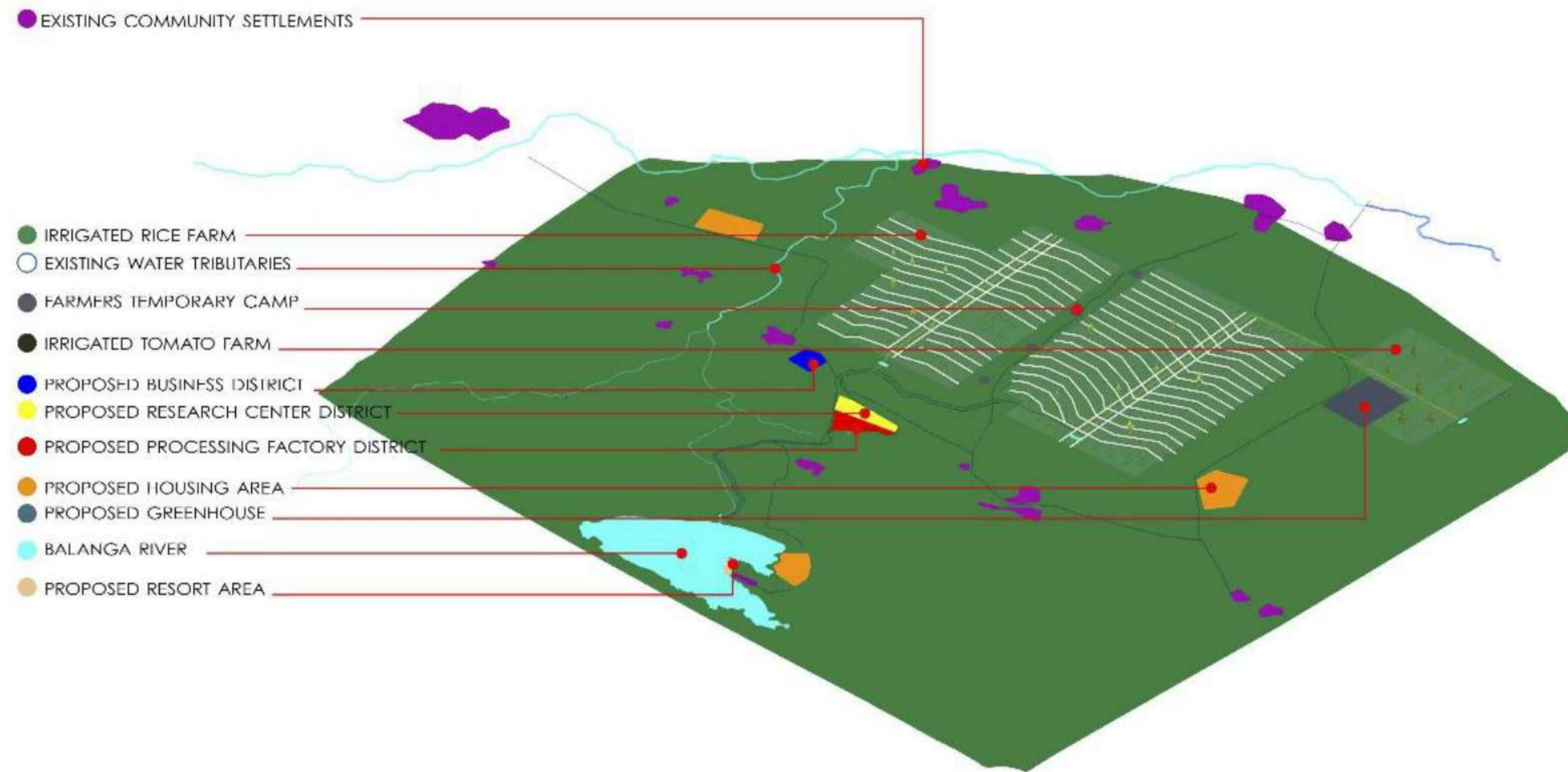

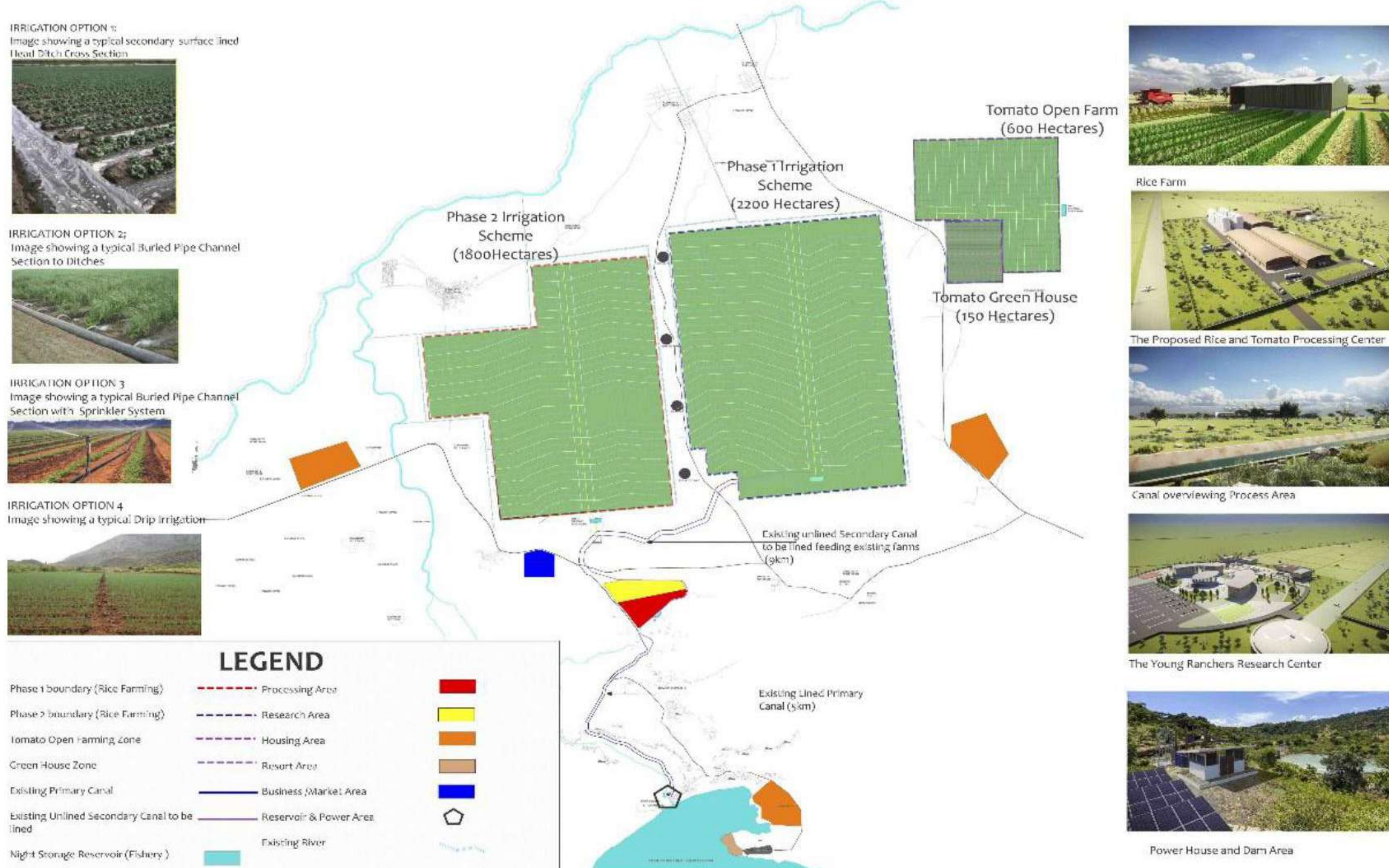


Figure 10: Overview of the Young Ranchers-Site Development Prototype; Each impression will be organized in a cluster of farms, processing units, small business accommodation, education facilities and living areas.
